Established in 2001 with the mission "to create opportunities for individual and community growth through education and other sustainable projects," the Niswonger Foundation was envisioned and implemented by Scott M. Niswonger who saw the critical importance of investing in the place he calls home.

The guiding principle leading to the success of this work is Scott's philosophy of "Learn – Earn – Return." Following his model of dedication to his home community, the programs of the Foundation seek to empower others to learn a skill, gain wisdom, and earn a living that can support families and the community. Importantly, he believes that wisdom and those earnings should be returned through work and service in greater measure than has been provided to each of us.

The Foundation has a solid reputation as a regional, state, and national leader in support of quality public education through the efforts of its School Partnership Programs. While advancing the cause of quality education, in general, the Niswonger Foundation is known for designing and implementing work in support of meeting the challenges of rural education. Fundamental to the success of the Niswonger Foundation has been a clear focus on removing constraints to educational innovation and problem solving, thus allowing school districts to better provide for student needs. Through numerous private, state, and federal grants, this work spans pre-kindergarten through post-secondary educational research, professional development, and direct student support.

The leadership of Northeast Tennessee is being directly supported by the Niswonger Scholarship and Leadership Program. With the first class of Scholars selected in 2002, these leaders are contractually committed, in cooperation with the Niswonger Foundation, to live, work and serve in this region that has heavily invested in their futures. The "return" is already evident, with Niswonger Scholar Alumni serving as teachers, counselors, doctors, nurses, engineers, professors, business leaders, and more, across Northeast Tennessee.

AN OPERATING FOUNDATION

The Niswonger Foundation was founded by businessman and philanthropist Scott M. Niswonger. Unlike most private foundations, the Niswonger Foundation was established as an operating foundation with its own programs and projects. The Foundation is also approved as a charitable organization. Though a percentage of its operating funds go towards grant making, most funds go into the Foundation's two primary programs: a scholarship and leadership program for selected college students committed to returning to the region and a partnership program for schools.




SPOTLIGHT ON BIG*BRIGHT*FUTURE

For six years now, NiswongerCARE's Big*Bright*Future (B*B*F) summer melt initiative has successfully prepared recently graduated seniors for the next step in their personal education journey: post-secondary education. The program mitigates "summer melt," or the phenomena where recently graduated students never actually register for fall semester coursework even though they have been admitted and plan to attend a post-secondary institution.

B*B*F students receive

- weekly personalized text messages based on their college choice throughout the summer and early fall;
- progress tracking and monitoring from CARE advisors who meet them where they are;
- guidance to navigate through the final steps to official post-secondary enrollment;
- and information regarding post-secondary updates, changes, and deadlines.



COLLEGE-GOING RATES EXCEED STATEWIDE AVERAGE

Since the program's inception in 2017, students who have participated in B*B*F have consistently enrolled at post-secondary institutions at higher rates than other students across the state. This year, the college-going rate of B*B*F students was 68%—nearly 15% higher than the state average!

Comprehensive Educational Resources (CER) is an educational consortium that serves 28 school districts in Northeast Tennessee and across the state. A collaborative partnership between these school districts and the Niswonger Foundation, CER reaches approximately 134,000 students.



2023 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- CER reached 9.473 teachers, 134.000 students, and 295 schools in 28 districts.
- Twenty educators from 7 districts are participating in the current CER Leadership Academy cohort.
- CER expanded the number of Common Formative Assessments (CFAs) this year to include grades 3-8 (math, ELA, science, and SS) and all EOC subjects. The number of school districts using these CFAs also increased to 22.
- CER created supplemental materials and course content to support: AP Human Geography, K-5 writing, K-5 integrated science, new statewide computer science standards, 6-8 standards, Social Studies standards, and Math standards.

LEADERSHIP ACADEMY

CER Leadership Academy is a year-long program where a cohort of teacher leaders from CER districts take a hands-on approach to learning about the practical aspects of school administration. Led by current principals and district supervisors, the academy works in a collaborative way to develop potential administrators for each participating district who are ready to face the challenges of school leadership from day one.

OVER 3,000 EDUCATORS ATTEND LEARNING TOGETHER DAY 2023

K-12 educators across Northeast Tennessee joined their colleagues for the third annual **Learning Together Day** on October 16, 2023.

Held simultaneously at nine different locations throughout the region, this event gave educators the opportunity to engage in subject-specific discussions centered around best practices in their field and to build relationships with their regional colleagues.

DEVELOPING ACADEMIC COACHES

Developing Academic Coaches (DAC) supports instructional coaches with direct job-embedded training, guided coaching cycles, and high-leverage instructional tools provided by the New Teacher Center. In early 2023, DAC partnered with CER to lead instructional coaching collaboratives, meeting quarterly with 81 instructional coaches throughout the state. DAC also leads 24 districts in 6 different math textbook collaboratives designed to support implementation. These collaboratives participate in class visits to script best practices around adopted materials and share them across the consortium.



Project On-Track is a high-dosage, low-ratio math and ELA tutoring program serving grades 1-8 in Northeast Tennessee. As a TN Accelerating Literacy and Learning Corps (TN ALL Corps) partner, Project On-Track ensures students receive frequent, direct support from highly-trained tutors.

2023 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- Project On-Track served 7,689 students from 110 schools in 18 school districts.
- Approximately 88% of students served during the 2022-2023 school year made academic gains based on benchmark assessments in literacy and math.
- Other school districts and community partners have replicated Project On-Track's tutoring model.

Because of Project On-Track, student participants and their families can access athome academic support, such as books for students' at-home libraries and a variety of math manipulatives.

After curating a list of quality, grade-appropriate books, Project On-Track staff delivered over 7,000 books to students who participate in literacy tutoring. Each child received 3 books to take home and read with their families. Additionally, over 700 math students took home gift bags of math manipulatives, which helps students practice their critical thinking skills through a hands-on approach and allows them to continue their learning at home.

Staying Connected

Project On-Track stays connected with students and their families through a monthly newsletter, a text-messaging platform called Signal Vine, and a monthly parent webinar.

STEM.LD HOSTS FIRST ANNUAL SUMMER INSTITUTE

STEM.LD hosted its first annual **Summer Institute** on June 22, 2023 at Greeneville High School. Over 125 educators from across the region spent the day learning about high-quality, engaging STEM instruction and student activities.

Several local and national partner organizations shared innovative instructional strategies and hands-on learning activities with attendees. These organizations included East Tennessee State University, Walters State Community College, University of Alabama in Huntsville, Purdue University, the Center for Excellence in STEM Education at ETSU, STEM Education Works, TNTP, and BioBuilder.

Teacher Kim Casteel attended BioBuilder's synthetic biology session twice to be able to confidently implement the activity in her classroom at North Greene High School. She said, "I love that this session allowed participants to fill the roles of students to perform a new, higher order lab centered around emergent biotechnology."

TRANSFORMATIVE SCIENCE INSTRUCTION

Jerry Graham and Grace McKinney, both STEM.LD participants and sixth grade science teachers at Greeneville Middle School, shared what they had learned about phenomenon-based instruction with other educators at the Summer Institute. This type of instruction is student-centered, encouraging them to actively learn through observation before jumping into new concepts. McKinney says it has completely transformed her classroom because "it allows students to grasp difficult concepts in fun ways that are meaningful and lasting."

Graham will present this session to educators from across the country at the National Science Teachers Association's Annual Conference in March 2024.

The AP Access for ALL (APAA) program is a partnership between the Tennessee Department of Education and Niswonger Foundation. The Niswonger Foundation's extensive history in virtual instruction through Niswonger Online serves as a valuable foundation for this online supplemental program.

2023 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- Over **2,400 students** from **226 schools** across Tennessee enrolled in APAA courses during the 2022-2023 academic year.
- APAA students earned 50% more high school AP credits from year 1 to year 2.

- empowered educators have participated in APAA professional development in record numbers. APAA approved 1,241 AP Summer Institute scholarships, awarded 219 AP mini grants, and trained and hired 115 teachers to teach APAA courses.

Niswonger Online offers over 50 General Education courses, providing students across the state access to a wide variety of classes that may not be available at their home high school. Since the summer of 2014, 16,376 credits have been earned through Niswonger Online courses. In 2023, several new courses were developed to give students access to even more choices as they build their schedules in 2024. Additionally, Niswonger Online continues to provide support for schools experiencing teacher shortages, particularly in world languages, math, and science.

CareerConnect is a workforce education and career-readiness program offered by the Niswonger Foundation in partnership with local education agencies and industries. Participants, known as Explorers, begin their CareerConnect journey in 10th grade and continue through 12th grade. CareerConnect students explore career paths, develop "soft" or "essential" skills, earn work ethic distinction, and gain real-world work experience.



2023 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- CareerConnect served over 400 students in 23 schools.
- CareerConnect hosted the "Be Pro Be Proud" career simulation truck in Greeneville, Morristown, Washington County, and Kingsport to give students hands-on learning experience in many different careers, including construction, CDL truck driving, and journeyman/lineman electrical.
- CareerConnect is offering "Career Safe" for students to earn an employability skills certification. Once students complete one module, they will earn a micro-credential. When students complete all 11 modules, they will earn the employability certification, which also counts as an Early Post-Secondary Opportunity (EPSO) in their school district.

Students apply for the CareerConnect Explorers program with the help of their guidance counselors. Students selected for the program attend CareerConnect meetings as well as a summer experience, complete all assignments, and remain in good academic and disciplinary standing.









PATHS TO SUCCESS

In early 2023, Scott Niswonger welcomed a group of CareerConnect Explorers to the Niswonger Foundation for a roundtable discussion with Marlin White, President of Chasan Industrial Complex in Greeneville and longtime contributor to CareerConnect.

The two businessmen shared the experiences that put them on the path to success and gave students their best advice, including learning from mistakes, taking risks, seeking mentors and effective role models, and not being afraid of hard work. Students were encouraged to ask questions and share their own thoughts and experiences during the roundtable.

CAREERCONNECT HIGHLIGHTED IN U.S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION RESEARCH

CareerConnect was highlighted as one of the most innovative rural career pathway programs in the nation in a recent white paper published by AnLar and the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Elementary and Secondary Education in March 2023. The paper, titled "Understanding Flexible Rural Career Pathways," noted the success and replicability of the program's hands-on career exploration and industry access components.

Work Ethic Distinction (WED) is a workforce readiness credential that can be earned by high school seniors in participating counties. Students who earn the WED will be given preference for job interviews at partnering employers if they meet all other qualifications of the job posting.
