#### STATEWIDE PARTNERSHIPS

By July 2024, APAA had partnered with 99% of school systems in Tennessee.

#### **ENROLLMENT GROWTH**

Since 2021, APAA has experienced over 72% enrollment growth, serving more than 7,500 students.

#### **TUITION SAVINGS**

APAA students have potentially saved over \$2 million in college tuition.

#### **AP EXAMS**

Since Year 1, almost 4,500 AP exams have been taken by APAA students.

# Career & Workforce Readiness



#### A Reflection from the Director



The Career & Workforce Readiness (CWR) division of the Niswonger Foundation strengthens connections between education and in-

dustry, preparing students for workforce success. Through its flagship CareerConnect program, CWR has empowered over 1,300 high school Explorers to develop essential skills, explore careers, and gain hands-on work experience. The program leverages cutting-edge technology and industry credentials to create innovative pathways to student success. CareerConnect rests on an unwavering belief: every student has the potential to find and excel in a career where they can flourish.

CWR's impact extends beyond students through educator externships, allowing teachers to gain firsthand industry experience that enhances their classroom instruction and career guidance. Additionally, CWR manages the Tennessee Work Ethic Distinction (WED) program, a state-recognized graduation credential earned by more than 5,600 Tennessee students. These integrated initiatives create robust bridges between K-12 education, postsecondary institutions, and workforce opportunities.

#### **Program Milestones**

#### **PROGRAM FORMATION**

Thanks to a generous private donation in Fall 2016, the CareerConnect program formed to serve five high schools in Greene County with the first cohort of Explorers selected the following Spring.

#### **WE TRACK LAUNCH**

An online platform began supporting the implementation of the Work Ethic Distinction program across the state in Fall 2017.

#### FIRST GRADUATING CLASS

The first class of Explorers graduated from high school in Spring 2019; many entered postsecondary institutions in pursuit of their career of choice.


#### **PROGRAM EXPANSION**

In Fall 2022, CareerConnect expanded to six more schools, serving four total school systems. Career-Connect expanded again in Fall 2023 to 12 more schools, serving 23 schools across 11 districts.

#### **TEACHER EXTERNSHIPS**

The educator externship program has supported 69 educators to date, connecting them to industries across three hubs in Anderson County, Morristown, and the Tri-Cities.

#### **Summer Experience**

Since its inception in 2017, the CareerConnect Summer Experience has consistently emerged as a transformative cornerstone of our program. During summer sessions, Explorers engage directly with industry partners and higher education institutions while developing essential skills and building networks with peers across CareerConnect chapters.



The program's foundational mission remains unchanged: inspiring students to envision bold futures while empowering them to actively shape their career trajectories. These summers create breakthrough moments as students discover new possibilities through peer collaboration and direct exposure to educational and career pathways.

The program's adaptability has been key to its success. From its early days of intensive two-week camps to virtual offerings during the pandemic,

CareerConnect has continuously evolved to meet changing needs. Summer 2024 marked another innovative step forward with our expanded "combine" model, designed to serve an unprecedented number of schools. This new format offered students concentrated two-day immersions across diverse fields including advanced manufacturing, healthcare, entrepreneurship, information technology, and hospitality. Participants engaged in hands-on simulations led by postsecondary faculty, gained insights from professional panels, and received exclusive access to regional employer facilities. The result was an engaging and educational experience that equipped our Explorers with valuable insights for their continuing career journeys.

## Comprehensive Educational Resources



#### A Reflection from the Director



Comprehensive Educational Resources (CER) is an educational consortium that currently serves 30 school districts in Northeast Tennessee and across the state. CER is a collabora-

tion between these 30 districts and the Niswonger Foundation that reaches approximately 156,000 students. The mission of CER is to improve student achievement by providing the following key elements: common benchmark assessments, reporting, common formative assessments, and pacing guides; data analysis; teacher created resources; and collaboration across our region.



#### **Program Milestones**

#### **SCALING UP**

CER served more students every year with a record of 156,000 students in 30 districts across Tennessee.



#### **LEADERSHIP SUPPORTS**

CER provided new supports and in-person trainings in West Tennessee for school leaders in addition to continuing principal study council and leadership academy.

#### **ACADEMIC COACH SUPPORTS**

CER established an Instructional Coach Summer Summit for coaches across the state, offered continuous training for math and writing, continued supports through the CER Coach Collaborative, and created a forum for new instructional coaches to connect. Dr. Sherry Cockerham, CER's Director of Mathematics and Coaching, leads this work.

#### **TEACHER SUPPORTS**

CER created thousands of materials for the CER website. Teacher leaders have also created high school credit exams and additional common formative assessments.

#### **MEETING THE MOMENT**

CER supported districts with job-embedded teachers by creating a new course, expanded support for districts through a monthly textbook collaborative, and developed pacing guides and lesson notes specific to several adoptions.

#### **Empowering Coaches**

ELA instructional coaches from the Hamblen County School District (*pictured above*) enjoyed discovering the learning-centered approach to writing instruction as part of a year-long training cycle with Dr. Cathy Presnell, 2024-25 Tennessee Supervisor of the Year and former Tennessee Teacher of the Year.

Participating Hamblen County ELA coaches include Dr. Tony Dalton, PreK-1 Instructional Coach; Sarah Yaksich, Grades 2-3 Instructional Coach; Donna Kanipe, Grades 4-5 Instructional Coach; and Dr. Rebecca Drinnon, Secondary ELA & Social Studies Coach.

During the first in-person session at the Niswonger Foundation, participants worked on developing a common understanding of literacy and defining the role of writing in classroom instruction. Participants enjoyed taking on the role of students in tackling high-quality instructional tasks and using the Read-Think-Talk-Write cycle to promote deeper understanding of text. These coaches walked away from their time with Dr. Presnell with hands-on activities and materials to use with the teachers they serve.

"The training empowered us as coaches to support our teachers with the process of writing so that they are better equipped to help students deepen their knowledge, pay attention to the world around them, and express their thoughts and feelings," said Dr. Dalton.

The six-session series will continue to convene through April 2025, exploring topics such as using writing-analysis protocol, giving high-quality feedback, and curating models of excellence to increase students' ownership of learning.

### School Readiness Initiative

With support from Ballad Health's Department of Population Health through the Community Health Improvement program and the Strong Accountable Care Community, the Niswonger Foundation has convened the Northeast Tennessee Consortium of School Districts, which includes representatives from Bristol City, Carter County, Cocke County, Elizabethton City, Greene County, Greeneville City, Hamblen County, Hancock County, Hawkins County, Johnson City, Johnson County, Kingsport City, Newport City, Rogersville City, Sullivan County, Unicoi County, and Washington County. Since this stakeholder group (pictured above) first began meeting in August 2022, they have developed an agreed upon definition of "school readiness" and have selected a universal screener for school readiness for the region. In the Fall of 2024, the Brigance Early Childhood Kindergarten Screen was used to assess the school readiness of every student in Northeast Tennessee. The data derived from this screening process will be instrumental in helping school districts and community agencies address the needs of students.

#### A Reflection from the Director



The NiswongerCARE College and Career Advising Program remains steadfast in

its commitment to empowering the students and schools of Northeast Tennessee. Since 2015, our program has worked to strengthen a college-going and career-ready culture, helping students in 26 high schools navigate access to postsecondary opportunities.

Supported by the State of Tennessee, our nearpeer staffing model includes 17 near-peer advisors, three graduate school counseling interns from local universities, two community college mentors, a postsecondary data coordinator, and two directors. This approach prioritizes meaningful relationships with students while also equipping young professionals with hands-on training and development.

In 2024, we expanded our efforts with Niswonger-START, a College Success Mentorship pilot in partnership with Northeast State and Walters State Community Colleges. This initiative extends our mission to support students beyond high school, ensuring smoother transitions into postsecondary education.

We are honored to serve this region and to help students build a brighter, more promising future.


#### **Program Milestones**

#### **ADVISOR EXPANSION**

NiswongerCARE expanded its team of advisors for the 2024-25 school year, increasing service days in each school to better support students and to align with stakeholder recommendations to have advisors available daily for greater impact.

#### **FAFSA COMPLETION KICK OFF**

NiswongerCARE Advisors helped thousands of Northeast Tennessee students complete the FAFSA application to secure their federal and state aid. NiswongerCARE continues to achieve FAFSA completion rates that surpass both state and national averages.



#### **BIG\*BRIGHT\*FUTURE SUMMER MELT**

NiswongerCARE Advisors served 740 class of 2024 graduates who enrolled in the Big\*Bright\*Future summer melt program, where students were given support and timely reminders to navigate matriculation tasks in preparation for their upcoming post-secondary education.

#### **NISWONGERSTART**

The NiswongerSTART college mentoring program launched in Fall 2024, enrolling over 100 students from the summer melt program who planned to attend local community colleges. At the end of the program's first semester, students were congratulated for completing their first semester of college with a celebration.



#### **Expanding Student Support**

This year, NiswongerCARE made significant strides in expanding its services to better serve students across the region. To enhance support for high school students, NiswongerCARE increased the number of college and career advisors, ensuring that more students receive direct, daily guidance in navigating their academic and future career pathways.

The expansion goes beyond high school, with the introduction of the NiswongerSTART postsecondary mentoring program. This innovative initiative was piloted with a group of students matriculating to Walters State and Northeast State Community Colleges, providing specialized support during their critical first year of transition from high school to college. The program is designed to help students navigate the challenges of adjusting to the postsecondary environment, fostering a seamless transition to higher education.


The growth of NiswongerCARE's services is making an immediate impact. With more advisors spending more time in schools providing vital support to students throughout their high school years and into college, relationships are deepening and a sense of continuity has been established. 


NiswongerSTART Student Feedback (Fall 2024)

Niswonger Online proudly serves students across Tennessee. Our fully online courses are aligned to Tennessee state stan-



#### A Year of Growth

Enrollment in Niswonger Online courses grew by 12.56% between academic years 2022-2023 and 2023-2024. Last year, the three most-enrolled course categories were world languages, social studies, and CTE.

#### **Program Milestones**

#### **WORLD LANGUAGES**

The Spring 2024 term was a milestone in the World Language department as it was the first time we offered a level 3 class for all four languages in the same term. Students went above and beyond the required and gained a deeper understanding of American Sign Language, French, Latin, and Spanish

#### **TEACHER RETENTION**

Niswonger Online employed 43 adjunct teachers in the 2023-2024 school year. Over 70% of those teachers have worked for Niswonger Online for three or more years. Approximately 10 teachers have 10 or more years experience with Niswonger Online.

#### **MIDDLE SCHOOL**

Twenty-one 8th grade students at North Greene Middle School earned a record number of high school credits in Spring 2024, with three students going on to earn additional credits in Summer 2024. In total, 37 high school credits were earned by these students.





#### **Supporting Students**



#### **Bridging the Gap**

Niswonger Online served more schools over the past few years with full classes as the state-wide teacher shortage impacted our partner schools. As administrators and teachers, we feel that the very best option for all students is an in-person teacher. But in the absence of a highly qualified teacher, we aim to be the very best back-up option. We partnered with Cosby High School in the 2023-24 academic year to offer online Geometry and Chemistry courses. This partnership was highly successful, with an 89% success rate due to the commitment of students, teachers, and administration.

## Project On-Inack

#### A Reflection from the Director



Project On-Track began serving school districts in the summer of 2021 in the midst of COVID. The pandemic left students, on average, five months behind in math and four months behind in reading by the end of the 2021-22

school year, with even more significant losses for students in majority-Black or low-income schools. The tutoring program is now in its fourth year of serving students in math and literacy across the region.

High-dosage tutoring, sometimes called "high-impact" or "high-intensity" tutoring, is one of the few school-based interventions with demonstrated significant positive effects on math and reading achievement. Project On-Track has been highly effective because the program supports data use and trains tutors to use ongoing assessments to tailor individual student instruction. As a bonus, these sessions have allowed tutors more opportunities to measure student achievement through informal assessments, potentially providing new holistic accountability measures.

Project On-Track continuously shows the benefits of high-dosage tutoring. Some districts have reported increases in students' learning by an additional three to 15 months based on T-CAP results and Universal Screening reports.

#### **Program Milestones**

#### **CARE PARTNERSHIP**

In 2021, the CARE Foundation and the Niswonger Foundation committed to a three-year partnership to provide tutoring to students in the First Tennessee region.

#### STATE PARTNERSHIP

The Niswonger Foundation and Project On-Track were awarded a \$9 million grant from the Tennessee Department of Education in 2022.

#### **ENROLLMENT GROWTH**

Over 1,200 students were served each semester in 2021-2022. By Fall 2024, over 3,700 students were enrolled in Project On-Track tutoring sessions.

#### **TUTOR TRAINING**

In 2022, Project On-Track embedded Trauma-Informed Practices training as part of the tutors' professional learning protocols.

#### **REACHING FAMILIES**

Over 24,000 books and math games have been disseminated to students and their families between April 2023 and December 2024.

#### **Engaging Families**

Partnering with parents and caregivers is an important component of Project On-Track's success. Parents and caregivers are given informational letters at the beginning of the school year, outlining the details of the tutoring program. During the school year they receive project news and parent resources via a text messaging platform, Text Em All. Project On-Track has had over 1,600 parents sign up for the text messaging platform during the 2024-25 school year. Students and families also receive regular reports highlighting student learning progress and take-home resources such as books and math games to continue student learning at home.



My work schedule put me home by 10 p.m. the past several years, and now battling a serious illness my work schedule does not prevent me from helping my daughter (as I am no longer working) but being sick many days does. The added stress of no income and moving to low-income housing has taken a great toll on her confidence in her abilities. It really does take a village to help raise a child. This village is more appreciated than you could ever know."

#### **Student Success**

Project On-Track students showed marked improvement across three benchmark periods: Beginning of the year (BOY), Middle of the year (MOY), and End of the year (EOY).

During the 2023-2024 school year, students in grades 3-8 who participated in Project On-Track's standard-based tutoring averaged six percentage points higher on their EOY than their BOY benchmark assessments.



Project On-Track served 3,777 students in grades 1-8 after receiving an additional \$3.7 million in funding from the State of Tennessee.

# Learning Design



#### A Reflection from the Director



For the past four years, STEM Learning Design (STEM.LD) has served students

and teachers in grades 6-12 by providing professional learning to teachers and out-of-school-time activities and advanced coursework to students. To date, 56 schools in 16 school systems have participated in the \$8.8 million research grant, impacting more than 21,300 students.

Teachers have participated in learning opportunities such as curriculum implementation, 3D printing, and robotics while students have attended robotics competitions, STEM camps, and cyber challenges. New advanced courses have been launched including online courses from ETSU and Walters State Community College; online cybersecurity courses through Niswonger Online; and BioSTEM I-IV, a new CTE pathway focused on biotechnology that is now available in several high schools in Northeast Tennessee.

Finally, STEM.LD has developed a new tool that connects students and teachers to STEM opportunities in their region. STEM FLEX will launch in early 2025, providing a one-stop shop where students can find activities, classes, or competitions of interest and register to attend.

STEM.LD trained 85 educators in OpenSciEd, an open source curriculum, and provided each one with materials for classroom implementation.

Grant partners created curriculum for 10 STEM courses, including a BioSTEM pathway for high school students and several college-level courses.

#### **SUMMER INSTITUTE**

The STEM.LD Summer Institute was offered in 2023 and 2024 for teachers in Northeast Tennessee with over 100 educators in attendance each time.




#### **BioSTEM: an Emerging Field**

Through a partnership with BioBuilder and the participation of three school districts in Northeast Tennessee, STEM.LD has created a biotechnology curriculum for the state's BioSTEM CTE pathway. Students who pursue this pathway take four courses and are eligible for a valuable industry certification. This cutting-edge programming prepares students for a variety of careers, from agricultural research to biotechnical manufacturing.

Teachers collaborated with leadership from STEM. LD partners to write the curriculum and participated in a four-day training during the summer of 2024. Response to the training was overwhelmingly positive. Teachers with decades of experience said it was one of the better in-service trainings they had ever attended. One teacher said, "I would hope anybody teaching this program would have access to the same kind of content-rich PD that we got to have this week."

Five regional high schools are offering BioSTEM I in their 2024-25 schedule with over 500 students enrolled. Observations of classrooms during the first semester of the 2024-25 school year show students

have a high level of engagement with and enthusiasm for the content. In the second course in the sequence, students will be introduced to BioSTEM II content embedded within the Biology I class. Beyond that, students may elect to participate in BioSTEM III and IV where they will have opportunities for research, work-based learning, and industry certification.
